Prayer for the Democratic Republic of Congo and Sudan

Dearest brothers and sisters in Christ,  
dear brothers and sisters of many different faiths,

We note with bitterness, disappointment, and suffering that, since the end of the Second World War, there have never been so many armed conflicts in the world as at this time. To speak of wars means to think of the victims, both in terms of deaths and lives marked by forced displacement, the destruction of homes, wounds to body and mind, as well as by hatred that multiplies and is destined to continue over time. Among the conflicts that do not receive much media attention, and which, for this reason too, deserve our attention, are the wars underway in the **Democratic Republic of Congo and Sudan**. Unfortunately, there are neither reporters nor correspondents capable of providing us with updated information and images of the massacres and violence inflicted on the populations of the areas affected by these "hidden conflicts."

This is yet another reason to pray for the inhabitants of those places, subjected to every kind of cruelty and barbarity and living in terror. Recently, we have received terrifying news from missionaries, NGO staff, and some of the people living in those areas themselves. I ask you to join their tears in your prayers on November 27th, our monthly meeting that sees the invocation for peace rise to heaven from believers of many different religions, who know how to unite the voices of their souls in a single plea for peace, as we learned from the historic meeting in Assisi on October 27, 1986.

Let us therefore pray for the people of the Democratic Republic of the Congo and Sudan. May the one God hear the pain of his children and the prayers rising to him from so many parts of the world.

Many Christian groups have expressed disappointment with COP30's outcomes, highlighting a lack of progress on crucial issues like climate finance and the fossil fuel phase-out. While acknowledging some positive moments, they called for stronger political will to ensure future commitments are grounded in justice and human rights.

A key demand was for richer nations to fulfill their financial obligations to support developing countries in adapting to the climate crisis and transitioning to clean energy. With many criticising the lack of financial pledges from developed countries to help vulnerable nations adapt to climate impacts and fund a transition away from fossil fuels.

[Christian Aid's](#) Global Advocacy Lead, Mariana Paoli, said: *“Brazil said this would be the ‘COP of truth’ – but the truth is, this was a disappointing outcome with only mild gains made in tackling the climate crisis.” “Overall it feels like this year’s summit was a missed opportunity for a COP taking place in the Amazon to step up meet the climate challenge head on. Without a better vision for what is required, poor and vulnerable people will continue to suffer from a problem they didn’t create.”*
